Year in Review

This past year, the Portland Children's Dyslexia Center was tasked with becoming a self-supporting member of the Children's Dyslexia Centers. The mandate has required a big cultural and operational shift, and it has resulted in both encouraging results and a hum of exciting energy. We are so grateful for everyone's participation in our new endeavors. In particular, we'd like to highlight:

- * The traditional 15K Dash for Dyslexia added a 5K and a post-race pancake breakfast. Attendance improved from about 20 to about 150, and we raised nearly \$8,000.00
- Restaurant Nights with partners such as Panera Bread, Elsmere BBQ, and Texas Roadhouse gave families an opportunity to enjoy fellowship with one another while supporting the Center
- Our Teacher Training Pilot Program with RSU 5 concluded with excellent results - students made gains across all assessments, including double digit gains in 80% of said tests
- We refreshed our logo and launched a new website www.dyslexiacenterportland.org
- Our first Annual Appeal raised nearly \$14,000.00, which outperformed our original goal by about 140%
- * Fellowship and Fundraising once again combined for our Inaugural Silent Auction at the Portland Masonic. The atmosphere was inspiring, the food was excellent, the entertainment was superb, and the incredible auction items helped us raise over \$12,000.00. See more on page 2
